 All diverse learners are encouraged to work to their full potential and be reminded of their God-given talents, which are showcased throughout the year during Bullying Awareness Week, Black History Month, Open House, Christmas Concerts, Catholic Education Week, FDK year-end celebrations, Grade 8 graduation and Sacramental

preparation, mindfulness (primary students), as well as opportunities to participate in extra-curricular activities.

 PALS, CCCCAT, YFAs, WITS, Christian Meditation and Virtues assemblies and liturgies, and bus patrollers are vehicles, which support our safe school initiatives and guide students to making good choices modeled on Jesus' actions.

A Caring Family Member

- Students participate in monthly virtues assemblies, social justice initiatives, food drives, school masses and sacramental preparation, and daily prayers/Christian Meditation.
- PALS, CCCCAT, YFAs, WITS and Virtues assemblies, fundraising for, Terry Fox and ShareLife provide students with opportunities to apply Jesus' teachings to a wider community and witness the connection between School-Home and Parish.

A Responsible Citizen

 Students are expected to follow the Catholic Code of Conduct and through progressive discipline, reflect on making good choices. PALS, CCCCAT, YFAs, WITS and Virtues assemblies are vehicles, which support our safe and inclusive school initiatives and guide students to making good choices modeled on Jesus' actions.

Celebrating Virtues:

A virtue is a habit or established capacity to perform good actions according to a moral standard. When we practice these virtues, we strengthen them and thereby make the presence of God more and more visible in the world around us.

The Virtues program is an integral component of our Catholic school; classroom teachers regularly implement the program through integration with daily curriculum and learning opportunities. School administrators and teachers infuse the virtues when assisting students to problem-solve and learn how to better foster relationships with peers. Classes and/or YFAs plan and prepare monthly liturgies/presentations on the Virtue of the Month.

Parents/Guardians and family members are invited to celebrate the Virtue of the month as recipients from each class receive recognition for demonstrating the Virtue of the month and through the actions and random 'Acts of Kindness' incentive program.

Visible Signs of our Faith:

Through symbol and service, we are instruments of God's love whose work within our communities stands as a witness to our faith.

School-wide Christian Meditation, individual classroom Christian Meditation.

- Each class is involved in daily prayers over the public address system. Readings are taken from a variety of sources: Children's Daily Prayer, and resources from Lenten and Advent Handbooks. Children also create their own prayers and thoughts for the day to share with the school community as appropriate.
- All Saints Day Posters on Display (St. Thomas More displayed at entrance of school).
- Prayers before lunch and before dismissal; individual class prayers in morning and afternoon; Rosary is prayed on a monthly basis.
- Prayers specifically for Bullying Awareness Week and Black History Month.
- Individual teachers use prayer in other ways during the school day as appropriate. Students are encouraged to pray for others as various events unfold in the school, local and world community throughout the school year.
- Cross in front hall, prayer tables in each classroom, front hall virtue display.
